A Beka Six-Steps to Reading with Phonics and Cursive

- **Step 1:** Learn to recognize the short vowels and their sounds.
- **Step 2:** Learn to recognize the consonants and their sounds.
- **Step 3:** Learn to blend.

 [Blending the sounds of a consonant with a vowel is the first step to reading words: sa se si so su, etc.]
- **Step 4:** Learn to sound one-vowel words (short vowel sound). [When there is one vowel in a word, it usually says its short sound.]
- **Step 5:** Learn the sounds of the long vowels. Learn to sound two-vowel words. [Rule: When there are two vowels in a word the first vowel says its long sound, and the second vowel is silent.]
- **Step 6:** Learn to apply the special sounds
 [The kinder program basically teaches the first 8 Phonics Charts.]

Initially I was just interested in understanding the content and organization of the A Beka Kindergarten phonics based reading program. I retyped the Decodable Readers in order to do a study of the vocabulary and phonetic sequence in each Reader. After finishing that interesting and revealing study, I realized that I had all the words together in usable format for making fluency exercises. I deleted all the duplicates so each word is used only once in the exercises.

Note the so-called sight words are <u>underlined</u>. There are not enough sight words in the A Beka program to cause artificially induced whole-word dyslexia in students. The Beka program ranks close to a Code 10 or pure phonics program on a scale of 1 to 10, with 1 being pure sight words and 10 being pure phonics words.

The outcome of the study highlights the excellence of the A Beka six-step phonics approach to teaching reading.

Notice that on page 9, I have included all the words in cursive. It is good to have the students practice reading the word in regular print and cursive to develop the ability to identify letters of varying sizes and shapes. This is a very important skill for all readers – and one very distinct advantage of teaching cursive first.

Note that A Beka makes special provisions to make certain the students can relate the printed letters to the cursive letters so they are perceptually totally interchangeable for word identification.
